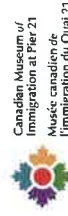
## About King's

## Why do the Humanities matter today?

The Humanities ask—and answer—the big questions about our lives. Studying the Humanities will help you develop the critical thinking and communication skills that are crucial to meaningful employment, active citizenship, and healthy relationships.

Research backs us up on this: it shows that young people who pursue studies in the Humanities have a broad and flexible skill set, which allows them to confront the unpredictable future with creativity, ingenuity, and resilience.

The Humanities encourage us to examine works of art, literature, philosophy, and political science (among others!) to assist us as we try to understand and improve our world and ourselves.

## What will I learn?

The theme for HYP 2018 is Migration. According to the United Nations, "an unprecedented 65.6 million people around the world have been forced from home". Canada prides itself on its multiculturalism, its relatively open

borders, and its status as a "country of immigrants". What role can we play in this global crisis? HYP 2018 offers you the chance to think about the cultural, historical, philosophical, and political issues that inform Canadians' understanding of immigration.

You'll grapple with questions such as: *what does it mean to leave home? What does it mean to belong? How can we help newcomers preserve aspects of their cultures of origin? What do we do when these cultural claims clash? How does one become "Canadian"?*

You'll engage with a wide-ranging curriculum that will take you from Ancient Greece to contemporary debates about migration. You'll encounter migrant literature. You'll study philosophy that has shaped our understanding of human rights. You'll spend a day exploring the archives and exhibits at Pier 21, a historic first point of contact for many Canadian migrants. You'll work with professors, journalists, lawyers, advocates, authors, and artists to enrich your understanding of the complex experience of migration.
